Welcome to the Scholars at Risk (SAR) 2020 Global Congress, a virtual gathering via Zoom on Thursday, March 26 and Friday, March 27. Marking SAR's 20th year of service to the higher education community, the Congress brings together SAR Network members and partners around the world to explore the theme, **Truth**, **Power & Society: The Promise of Higher Education in Challenging Times.** In times of historic challenges not only to higher education, but to society in general, truth itself is under attack. The Congress theme recognizes this, and points to three core roles of higher education in response to these attacks: research and teaching leading to new insights and understanding; evidence-based contributions to public discourse and policy; and meaningful engagement with the broadest public good. How scholars, students, leaders, and the public understand these roles goes to the heart of increasing pressures on higher education around the world—from outside infringements on autonomy, violent protests, and wrongful prosecutions to imprisonment and more.

With the onset of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19), these concerns are supercharged. Medical professionals and scholars across disciplines are playing a vital role in responding to the epidemiological, economic, political, and cultural dimensions of this crisis, as they will in the eventual recovery and restoration of essential functions and services of our institutions and society. At the same time, deliberate interference with the dissemination of data and intentional or negligent distortion of information delivered to the public and policy makers alike appear to have contributed to delayed and disorderly responses. How do we defend scientific integrity and academic freedom? Why should society value quality higher education during such a critical time?

The Congress provides a forum to discuss the importance of free and open university spaces, develop good practices for navigating unique challenges facing academia, and create opportunities to protect threatened scholars, promote academic freedom, and defend everyone's freedom to think, question, and share ideas.

We thank you for joining us over these two days and for your partnership in our shared and ever-strengthening global network. We look forward to our continued work together.
